Dakota Alano's Newest Meeting:

Dual Recovery Anonymous (DRA) Meeting Saturdays at 4:00 p.m.

The purpose of the dual recovery meeting is to help one another achieve dual recovery, prevent relapse, and to carry the message of recovery to others who experience a dual disorder. The Dual Recovery Program is based on the principles of the Twelve Steps and the personal experiences of men and women in dual recovery.

A dual disorder occurs when an individual is affected by both chemical/alcohol dependency *and* an emotional or psychiatric illness. Individuals who have a desire to stop using alcohol and other intoxicating drugs, as well as, a desire to manage their emotional or psychiatric illness in a healthy and constructive environment can benefit from a dual recovery meeting.

Step One -

We admitted we were powerless over alcoholthat our lives had become unmanageable.

Tradition One -

Our common welfare should come first; personal recovery depends upon A.A. unity.

Tradition One - Long Form

(from Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions)

Each member of Alcoholics Anonymous is but a small part of a great whole. A.A. must continue to live or most of us will surely die. Hence our common welfare comes first. But individual welfare follows close afterward.

Concept One-

(from the pamphlet The Twelve Concepts for World Services)

Final responsibility and ultimate authority for A.A. world service should always reside in the collective conscience of our whole Fellowship.

TRADITION ONE

January, the beginning of the New Year, is typically a time when A.A. members reflect or focus on Step One. It is also an appropriate time to reflect on Tradition One and A.A. Unity.

The long form of Tradition One states:

Each member of Alcoholics Anonymous is but a small part of a great whole. A.A. must continue to live or most of us will surely die. Hence our common welfare comes first. But individual welfare follows close afterward.

The following passages are about Tradition One "The unity of Alcoholic Anonymous is the most
cherished quality our society has. Our lives, the
lives of all to come, depend squarely upon it. We
stay whole, or A.A. dies. Without unity, the heart of
A.A. would cease to beat; our world arteries would
no longer carry the life-giving grace of God; His
gift to us would be spent aimlessly."
(Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions, pg 129)

"Probably no society places a higher value on the personal welfare of the individual member than does A.A. But long ago we found that the common welfare had to come first; without it there could be mighty little personal welfare. We found that there were forces among us that could threaten us ... There were the desires for power, for domination, for glory and for money. They were all the more dangerous because they were invariably powered by self-righteousness, self justification and the destructive power of anger, usually masquerading as righteous indignation.

Pride and fear and anger - these are the prime enemies of our common welfare. True brother-hood, harmony and love, fortified by clear insights, and right practices are the only answers. And the purpose of A.A.'s traditional principles is to bring these forces to the top and keep them there. Only then can our common welfare be served; only then can A.A.'s unity become permanent.

12 Thoughts about Tradition One -

- 1. Home groups can be torn apart by gossip, backbiting, and judging of others. (And where would we be without our home groups?)
- 2. Rotation gets new people involved so that God can be expressed through all of us.
- 3. There is a requirement for AA membership--a desire to stop and stay stopped drinking. We need to be sharing our experience on the solution rather than on the problem.
- 4. Taking care of our own group business and allowing other groups to do the same will ensure we continue to be here for the still-suffering alcoholic.
- 5. As individuals and as groups our primary purpose is the same, to get and keep one alcoholic talking with another.
- 6. Our groups carry the life-saving message of AA to alcoholics and let others do the same, with our blessing.
- 7. In AA we pay our way and are not influenced by others.
- 8. AA is love and service freely received and freely given. We do need to employ qualified people to keep certain services available and functioning.
- 9. We need a service structure directly responsible to ourselves.
- 10. We leave our personal, religious, and political feelings outside AA doors along with our worldly ambitions.
- 11. Very little attraction will show forth if we are promoting ourselves. Our recovery program is what's important to the public, not us as individuals.
- 12. Striving for the good of AA and the still-suffering alcoholic, with God's help, is a foundation we can build on. When we stand on our principles, we leave personalities behind us.

Monthly House Cleaning consists of:

- Vacuum all carpets: upstairs, downstairs, and stairway
- Vacuum and/or shake out mats in kitchen, hallway and bathroom
- Vacuum & damp mop linoleum floor (with Swiffer mop in front entry closet)
- Clean both bathrooms
- Clean kitchen sink and counter tops
- Wash all coffee pots
- Wipe down all tabletops in all rooms

After years of dedicated service in various positions on the Board and Advisory Board, Ellen J. would like to relinquish her position as Board Secretary if a dedicated replacement volunteer can be found.

While being on the Board of Directors is not a requirement to be Board Secretary, attendance at all Board meetings is required. Board meetings are held the 3rd Sunday of each month at 6:00 p.m. at the House. Possession of laptop and email capabilities are highly recommended.

Secretary responsibilites include:

- Taking minutes during meetings
- · Editing and finalizing minutes
- Email distribution of minutes to the Board
- Posting a copy of approved minutes on bulletin board
- Maintaining digital files for the archives
- Occasionally publishing flyers for events, etc.

Being Secretary for the Board is valuable service work because taking minutes is the only way Board business can be documented, and keeping an accurate record of Board meetings is important since business that takes place can directly affect all members of the House.

REGARDING HOUSE SECURITY

The Board has had ongoing concerns about the House being accessed during non-meeting hours. The Board requests that Squad Leaders be mindful of their responsibilities regarding the security of the House:

- Keys to the Alano House are the responsibility of the Squad Leader.
- Do not give or lend your key to any other member. Contact a Board member in advance of your meeting if you need someone to open or lock the House for you. Or there may be a Board member who attends your meeting regularly. Ask them to open the house for you.
- Open the House no more than <u>one hour</u> prior to the start of your meeting.
- Lock the House up no later than <u>one hour</u> after the close of your meeting.
- Check all 3 doors when leaving the house.
- Each group is entitled to only one key and will be responsible for the cost of a replacement key. The current charge for a new key is \$30.00.

If you are a Squad Leader who is unable to meet the above requests, please help your group to select a replacement Squad Leader. Your cooperation is very much appreciated.

NEW LOCK ON THE SIDE DOOR

To address security issues with the side door (the door on the landing of the stairs to the basement), a new lock has been installed. The side door will lock automatically upon closing and can not be opened from the outside. Squad Leaders are asked to check to make sure this door is latched when leaving the House.

GROUP LOCKERS IN THE KITCHEN

After considering several options, the Board has decided not to replace the locks on the individual group lockers in the kitchen. While unfortunate, it was agreed that the lockers would continue to be broken into if the locks were replaced. Groups are encouraged to use the lockers but not keep anything of value in them, including money, literature or medallions.

NOTE TO GROUP TREASURERS

Group treasurer's are reminded that the preferred method for making group donations is via check, payable to the Dakota Alano Society, Inc. The check should be placed in a donation envelope in the Treasurer's mail slot in the kitchen. Writing a check decreases the risk that the group's donation funds will be stolen.

Group treasurer's are encouraged to make their donations to the House weekly whenever possible. Pre-printed donation envelopes can be found in each groups mail slot in the kitchen. In order to meet expenses (rent, supplies, coffee, utilities, etc.) the Board requires that a minimum of 75% of the group's collection be donated to its treasury. The remaining 25% of the contributions are for the group to use at their discretion.

Dakota Alano Society

Dear Members,

It is with great pleasure that I tell you on October 9th I will have two and a half years of Sobriety. In August 2010 with just 89 days sober, I found myself alone in Minnesota for two weeks and I did not know anyone I was allowed to speak with except my lawyer. My plans were to see my 4 year old Son but a Judge changed those plans that day in court. After court I had to find a meeting (or an emergency room) and thank God Intergroup of St. Paul told me about a meeting at the Dakota Alano Society in 20 minutes. It was 5 minutes from the Microtel Inn and Suites in Eagan where I was staying.

The first night I could barely speak through the tears, pain and fear but what a relief I felt just walking into the room, I felt at home and no longer alone. In retrospect it taught me about the Traditions and AA Unity, and I am ever so Grateful to you all for your hands and hearts being there when I needed you most desperately. At the time I really did not have a relationship with my Higher Power, thank Him he had one with me and led me to your door. Now I am never alone because I found "that One" whom I now choose to call God and my Higher Power.

The first night or the next morning one member got his 26 Year Medallion. That second day I asked for and received my 3 Month Medallion (we call them Chips here in Pensacola, FL) and I have it to this day and carry it sometimes with my Beginners Chip and/or my 2 Year Chip. Other than that, it is in a special place for safe keeping as I cherish it as much or more than any others. The next morning before the meeting broke into groups (this was new to me) I asked for a temporary Sponsor and someone suggested the group address that request before we split into groups. About 9 people spoke to me and the fellow with 26 years became my temporary Sponsor, I believe his name was Joe but I am not sure. Whatever his name he should have gotten a 28 Year Medallion last August, and I especially want to thank him for his love and help while I was there. Because I was able to stay sober, my Son is now in my life even though we are miles and miles apart. Slowly the Promises are coming true for me . . . as Promised.

I was so thrilled when my new friend Alan asked me if I knew where any meetings were by the Mall of America as he has heard me mention Minnesota more than once. Of course I told him "you betcha"!!!... LOL, and I told him of my experience there and asked him to drop this note for me in person. Hopefully I will be up there soon to see my now 6 year old Son and thank you all again in person for being a part of my Recovery and loving me like one of your own, which I am to this day, one day at a time.
